While many believers today may not hear God's voice audibly, these biblical examples remind us that God is capable of speaking directly when He chooses. His voice establishes covenants, offers guidance, and reveals His will in unmistakable ways.

The Still Small Voice

While the audible voice of God may be aweinspiring, He often speaks in quieter, more intimate ways.

In 1 Kings 19:11-12, after Elijah had confronted the prophets of Baal and fled in fear, he encountered God on Mount Horeb. He expected to hear God in dramatic manifestations—the wind, the earthquake, or the fire—but God was not in any of these. Instead, He spoke in a "still small voice."





- A False Witness Who Speaks Lies A spirit that distorts truth, spreading falsehood to pervert justice and sow confusion.
- 7. **One Who Sows Discord Among Brethren** The divisive spirit, working to break unity, stir strife, and weaken the body of Christ.

These spirits are not mere bad habits or character flaws—they are forces of destruction, strategically deployed by the enemy to infiltrate and dismantle God's army from within. A battle axe dulled by corruption cannot be wielded in the hand of the Lord. A warrior entangled in these abominations becomes an ineffective weapon, compromised in spiritual warfare.

To rise as **God's battle axe**, we must first purge ourselves of these corrupt influences. The coming Episodes will expose each of these abominable spirits, revealing their nature, their destructive power, and the way to overcome them through righteousness, truth, and spiritual warfare. For the Lord is raising up a purified army—vessels of honor, ready for His purpose. Will you be counted among them?

Episode 2:

HAUGHTY EYES – PRIDE & ARROGANCE

"Pride goeth before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall." — Proverbs 16:18

The Weight of Bloodshed in Spiritual Warfare

God calls His people to be His **battle axes and weapons of war** (Jeremiah 51:20), but no weapon can remain in His hand if it is stained with the innocent blood of the defenseless. The shedding of innocent blood is not just an earthly crime—it is a spiritual abomination that defiles the land, invites divine judgment, and aligns with the agenda of darkness.

From the **first murder**—when Cain spilled the innocent blood of his brother Abel (Genesis 4:10)—to the many acts of oppression, genocide, and injustice recorded throughout history, God has **never turned a blind eye to innocent blood being shed.** He hears the cries of the oppressed, and He will judge the guilty.

God's Condemnation of Bloodshed

The Bible repeatedly warns against the shedding of innocent blood:

- Hatred & Unforgiveness As Jesus taught, unresolved anger is spiritual murder in the eyes of God.

The Call to Be a Battle Axe of Justice

As warriors of God, we must:

- Speak out against injustice Silence in the face of oppression makes us complicit in the shedding of innocent blood.
- Defend the defenseless Stand for the poor, the weak, the unborn, and the falsely accused.
- Repent of anger and hatred Every battle axe must be purified. If our hearts harbor hatred, we are no better than murderers.

Today, we see a similar deception in the widespread abuse of drugs, hallucinogens, and substances that open people to demonic influence.

The Bible warns that sorcery and drug-related spiritual deception go hand in hand. Many cultures, both ancient and modern, have used substances to induce trances, communicate with spirits, or alter consciousness—all of which are explicitly condemned by God.

The Danger of Seeking Power Apart from God

The Bible warns that seeking supernatural power outside of God's will leads to **spiritual destruction**. These practices open the door to deception, demonic influence, and a departure from faith. The enemy uses sorcery and witchcraft to lure people away from **God's truth** and into false promises of control, wisdom, or hidden knowledge.
